## Fr. Philip's

The evening news on radio or television often makes sad listening. More often than not they have brought to us news of war, violence, protests, strikes, crimes, abuses and so on. Occasionally - but not often enough to redress the balance - there is some good news that gladdens the heart. The author of this Sunday's second reading would have no doubt as to the reason for all the bad news. It is due, he would have said, to the fact that man is trying to be the god of his own living. It results from man's neglect of the wisdom of God, which is found basically in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, mediated to mankind by the Church. When man relies on his own resources alone, what results is a catalogue of woe. ***"Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they come from your cravings that are at war within you?"***

St. James was well aware of what happened when man relied solely on his earthly wisdom. Jealousy and selfish ambition leads to a lack of order in the community which, in turn, can give rise to almost any kind of evil deed. We have only to look about us in society to see the truth of his words. ***"You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts."*** What especially highlights the predicament modern man lands himself in, by relying solely on his own powers, is the way he is beginning to live increasingly in fear. The blessed Pope John Paul II had put it well in Encyclical 'Redemptor Hominis': *'The man of today seems to be under threat from what he produces, that is to say from the result of the work of his hands and, even more so, of the work of his intellect and the tendencies of his will ... it is or can be directed against him... He is afraid of what he produces - not all of it, of course, or even most of it, but part of it and precisely that part that contains a special share of his genius and initiative - can radically turn against himself; he is afraid that it can become the means and instrument for an unimaginable self-destruction compared with which all the cataclysms and catastrophes of history known to us seem to fade away'*. Even if the fear of global catastrophe is remote from our thoughts, we do not have to be a relict to discern the increasingly long shadow fear casts for many people in our own country, cities, and towns, whether it arises from the instability of economy, of society, increasing violence, discrimination, terrorism, or whatever.

Reflecting on this disturbing picture, we may be tempted to doubt whether people can ever live in peace, co-

operation, and in love, instead of being at loggerheads and in conflict. Yet we sense, deep down, that we are made for loving and being loved. Conflict may temporarily satisfy our desire for dominance, but usually ends by arousing in us that deep longing for peace and the moments of experienced love that truly satisfy us. Can we change ourselves and society ever? We try by means of better education, better economic and social structures. But we always seem to fall short! St. James, in today's reading, implies that this will be the fate of all our efforts until and unless we begin to learn the wisdom of God. Christianity gives us that wisdom in a nutshell. Because of what Jesus Christ was and did, we are not alone in our efforts to achieve harmony and peace. In him God became man. He lived, like us, a human life; he loved totally. He died on a cross to redeem us from the clutches of evil, within and without. And God raised him from the dead. He set up a small society: the Church, as a nucleus of the real life and harmony that we desire so much and need so badly. It has grown through the ages in breadth and depth. It is still incomplete, still growing; it has defects, due to our human grasp and practice of Christ's message. But it goes on, constantly renewed by God, to be the light that shines in the darkness of human misery and conflict. Our place is within it. Our task is to allow the wisdom of God, the light of Christ, to shine in our own lives first of all. For it has been truly said: *'Since war begins in the minds of men, it is in the minds and hearts of men that the opportunities and defenses of peace and love must first be constructed'*. And then we will not, indeed cannot, remain silent. We will proclaim with our words, and especially our deeds, what we have seen, felt, and heard.

Only in this way will there be peace, harmony, honesty, compassion and love in our world. Only in this way will the human progress man has made so dramatically in our times make human life on earth 'more human' and 'more worthy of man'. And that is ultimately the most essential question facing us today. As the Blessed Pope John Paul II put it: *'But the question keeps coming back with regard to what is most essential - whether in the context of this progress man, as man, is becoming truly better, that is to say more mature spiritually, more aware of the dignity of his humanity, more responsible, more open to others, especially the neediest and the weakest, and readier to give and to aid all'*. We pray then today for the wisdom *'that comes down from above'*, and we resolve to let it filter into the recesses of our minds and hearts. Or as someone puts it - we ask Christ to be a 'dayspring to the dimness of our hearts'.

## In Darkness We Come to Love the Light

The great composer Ludwig von Beethoven composed some of his best work, including the Ninth Symphony with its soaring Ode to Joy, after he had gone totally deaf. In the profound silence around him, he was still able to hear an inner music and translate that into something to share with the world. He is not unique in this, but how great artists accomplish this transformation is always a mystery.

The best works of literature and drama in our culture show us characters who grow through suffering. We, too, become fully rounded human beings through the struggles of our

lives. Those who never know suffering and obstacles often remain shallow and unaware of the sufferings of others.

Lest we think that this darkness is part of the fall of humanity, and that truly holy people live in unrelieved light, the lives of the saints and the words of our Scriptures remind us that the holiest among us often face the darkest burdens.

In our first reading from Wisdom, we hear the enemies of “the just one” plotting to place obstacles in his path for the sole purpose of driving him from his steadfast faith in God. St. John of the Cross coined the term “the dark night of the soul” to describe the sense of abandonment by God that he experienced.

All of this is not to say that suffering is a good in itself, that the more we take on, the greater we will be. This is the mistake that the spiritually ambitious often make. There’s enough suffering in the world without our manufacturing more. And we’ve all known people who were made bitter and cynical by the suffering they endured.

Exactly how we grow through suffering isn’t always clear. But it seems essential that we face the obstacles and challenges in our lives by staying close to God in the dark times. In order to do this, we need to build up a close relationship to God during the good times in our life as well. We need to know God and love God in order to

hold on to his promise to be with us, even in the midst of darkness.

Blessed Mother Teresa made headlines several years after her death when her journals revealed that in the midst of the most holy and selfless dedication to the poorest of the poor, she often felt an emptiness where the presence of Christ should have filled her soul. But she heeded Jesus’s words about becoming the least of all and the servant of all. In caring for those who had no one else to care for them, she found a way to live with her inner darkness. In doing so, she became a light for all those who encountered her or heard her story.

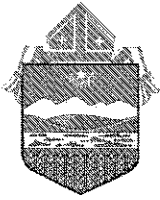
Mark’s Gospel makes no secret of the fact that the center of the story of Jesus is his passion and death. Mark’s original audience was being persecuted for following Christ. Mark wanted to let them know in no uncertain terms that the very suffering they were called to endure was part of the plan. I heard one preacher put it this way, “For Mark, if you haven’t suffered for the Gospel, you haven’t lived the Gospel.”

Jesus warns his followers that if they have expectations of temporal glory, of material wealth, of satisfied ambition, they will be disappointed and ultimately condemned. But the promise he offers them—and us—is that if they’re willing to go through the darkness, the light on the other side will be that much more dazzling. ✝
