


KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

We Are More United Than Divided

There's an old joke that goes, "There are two kinds of people in the world: those who divide people into groups and those who don't." This reflects the number of other statements that begin the same way.

While dividing people and groups into "us vs. them" seems to be a very human activity, we always need to remember that our ways are not God's ways and that while we might exclude those who do not share our beliefs, God's nature is always inclusive.

At some point in most religious movements, part of embracing the core

beliefs of the movement involves believers then setting themselves apart from those who don't share those beliefs. At its worst, this leads to the kinds of war and other violence that continue to tear apart so many places in our world today. Even in the best of situations, with respect and an openness to dialogue on all sides, there are no easy answers to the question of what to do with varying and, at times, opposing beliefs. We find it difficult to believe that we're right without saying that someone else is wrong.

Our first reading from the book of Numbers shows us Moses in one of his better moments. He often struggled with the stubbornness of the Israelites and the ambitions of Aaron and Miriam, his brother and sister. But here, when Joshua wants to silence two people outside the camp who are prophesying, Moses says, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the Lord were prophets!" This demonstrates a remarkable and graceful generosity of spirit on the part of the great leader.

Similarly in the Gospel, James and John object to someone who is healing in Jesus's name but isn't one of the Twelve or even apparently in the wider group of disciples. Jesus tells them, "Do not prevent him. There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me."

When we're tempted to dismiss a religious group for being "not like us" or when we become a little too triumphalist in our conviction that Catholicism is the one true faith, we need to step back and look at the intentions of others, as well as the good that they might be doing in the world. The glory of the Catholic Church is not diminished by the sincere belief of those who hold to other faiths. The fact that we believe that we have the fullest possible manifestation of God's grace in no way precludes God from reaching out to and saving those who believe differently. The wideness of God's mercy and the reach of his saving hand is something that none of us can truly comprehend.

In October 2011, Pope Benedict XVI invited the leaders of all the world's religions, as well as several prominent thinkers with no religious affiliation to join him in Assisi for the twenty-fifth anniversary of a similar gathering called together by John Paul II. Their prayers and speeches on that day called attention to the many common concerns of all God's people: peace, the environment, an end to poverty. They reminded us once again that, no matter what our doctrines and beliefs, there is more that unites us than divides us.

It's good to take time to remember this, not only on a cosmic or global scale, but with the other people in our everyday lives.

In old days a group of adventurers set out from the mainland by ship to conquer a new territory. Their leader was a dare man of fortune who announced that whoever touched land first would possess the entire territory. One of his group was determined to have new land. He rowed his canoe mightily from the mother ship, but a rival canoe pressed him hard, caught up with him, and then outstripped him. What could he do? This strong-nerved, iron-minded dropped his oars, seized a battle-axe, cut his left hand, and threw it upon the shore, so that he would be the first touch the land to make it his.

This gory and gruesome story helps us understand the gory and gruesome words of Jesus in the Gospel of this Sunday: "If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off, it's better for you to enter life maimed than with two hands to go to hell." What did Jesus mean?

He meant that his followers must be ready to sacrifice what is nearest and dearest rather than to disobey God by personal sins. Cutting off one's hand or foot or plucking out an eye is not to be taken literally, otherwise, in a few days, nothing would be left on our body. Christ did not mean that we must actually cut off a limb. Rather it was his way of stressing and strongly impressing on us that the kingdom of God, the eternal land we want to possess, is worth any sacrifice.

To get to heaven, besides the grace of the Lord, we must be ready to do something as drastic and painful as cutting off one's hand. Separating ourselves from some of our material goods can be as painful as plucking out one's eye. Yet, Jesus told us that if we feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, a home to the homeless, we will receive heaven. We must make some sacrifices in supporting God's Church and God's work of spreading the faith. We must make some sort of sacrifice in supporting the parish community. Often that is joyful but no less painful.

During this summer, we may have enjoyed seeing Olympic competitions in London. Do you know how much the athletes have to sacrifice for a medal? For instance a young diver from Quebec sacrificed six hours a day after school for training. The medal may

be a sign of her success, achievement, pride, and honor, and not only hers but her country too. I remember in the North, one of my friends sacrificed five days to follow a moose and finally he got it. In other words, to achieve something requires a sacrifice of something else.

Making a sacrifice to please God and to receive the heavenly homeland can be as painful as cutting off a leg. For a person who drinks more than he should to give up his bottle or even a single drink can cause what he considers pain. Yet, to please God he will do it.

Our body would prefer to lie in bed on Sunday morning rather than to go to Mass. The effort required, the struggle to overcome our laziness, can be inconvenient, uncomfortable in varying degree, but it is one way of laying claim to the kingdom of God.

Our responsibility toward our children is to raise them up and to train them in the practice of faith. But taking them to church on Sunday for Mass or catechism may be a big sacrifice on the part of parents. The children too, they have to sacrifice their hockey games to attend the catechism classes or to enjoy the youth night.

It's easier to sit and stare at the television until the last minute before bed, rather than to take some time to say a prayer or read a few lines from Scripture or your Catholic paper, or even to talk to your loved ones.

Talking to God is one of our greatest privileges, our keenest joys. But it does take effort to cut out some unimportant activities and get in touch with God. We, the priests and all volunteers have to sacrifice our time, our resources as we are serving any ministry in the parish.

Jesus made efforts. Jesus made sacrifices. He not only cut off his hand; he gave his whole body. We celebrate that giving, that sacrifice right in our church on the altar: the holy Mass. May God bless you.
